Central Themes: Education Sector

- Lack of adequate and centralized resources for meeting basic needs of children and their families
- Lack of community and schools' knowledge, trust and shared understanding of current conditions in all our schools and with our students
- Insufficient resources for providing educational opportunities beyond the basic core

What is Working? (All)

- How well kids and educators know each other as people
- Options available on island; various schools and educational options are important
- ✓ Diversity of educational options and staff/techniques
- ✓ Professionalism of people in preschools; how well everyone works together
- Public school ability to be open-minded and adaptive to populations. This was not true 10 years ago.
- Mix of teachers available to students.
- [Public school] Writing program is working
- The support of the community of a fluctuating population and diversity of needs
- ✓ ✓ Generosity of community with time and money; without which we would have a failing institution.
- We make sure our kids finish. It is a community effort, but we make sure our kids graduate and finish.
- All schools are child-centric as opposed to institution-centric.
- Outcome driven—there are many opportunities for kids—rich programs; synergy of community and staff.
- Choice and diversity of program offerings.

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- Consistent depth of caring and dedication to education and each family
- Creativity of educators
- Music in the schools; tremendous drive and enthusiasm for music and music programs.
- Contrast of offerings and programs.

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Question #:1 What Community Needs Are Not Being Met?

Group 1 (Moana's group)

- Pre-school: insufficient help with/resources for transitions (especially for ELL) to public school ● ●
- Lack of programs for highly capable students, especially at elementary level (Public School)
- Lack of summer programming for special ed, ELL or at-risk students—academic and life skills
- Lack of housing options for kids without stable homes—need for both shelter and family stability ● ● ● ●
- Lack of continuity with arts education; concerns regarding stability of leadership and funding ● ● ● ● ●
- Need better connection of community to schools
- Lack of adequate facilities, specifically public school
- Lack of adequate and central resources for strengthening families
 - Food bank, information food stamps, family resource center, especially for families dealing with poverty (+55% at elementary school). ● ● ● ● ●
- Way to connect art and music resource peoples from community to preschool-12
- Too few concerned, involved parents, particularly at public school. This can result in children acting out, which is disruptive. High level of family stress ● ●
- Lack of transition opportunities for special ed kids – lack of time
- Lack of stable funding for specialized programs and classes—highly capable, advanced classes, art, CTE, foreign language, summer programs for ELL and special ed. ● ● ● ● ● ●
- Non-adversarial community [parent-school?] meetings; meetings are problem oriented rather than establishing cooperation ●
- No public funding for continuity with Montessori School from pre-k and kindergarten into public school
- No foreign language k-8
- No stable funding for elementary school counselor
- Lack of offerings—classes
- Lack of community resources for families dealing with issues of poverty ● ● ●

Prioritized Listing of Unmet Needs:

1. Lack of stable funding for specialized programs (highly capable, arts, CTE, foreign language, summer programs for special education, and ELL).

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2. Lack of centralized and adequate resources for strengthening families, especial poverty (+55% in elementary school). (Tied with #3)
3. Lack of continuity in arts programs—specifically, leadership, funding, community connections. (Tied with #2)
4. Housing for kids without stable homes

- Lack of a safer place to "hang out" after school ●
- Lack of safe places for HS students to live
- Lack of educational opportunities for trade skills ● ● ● ● ●
- Community doesn't trust that the needs for the schools are true needs
- Disconnect between "haves" and "have nots" and only connect with self interest
- People/parents do not value education
- Lack of centralized communication with non-English speaking family (translation) Even lack of awareness translation is needed ● ● ● ●
- Lack of adequate curricular materials (\$)
- Lack of opportunities for teachers to interact with community and each other ● ●
- Unwillingness by some community to appreciate change ● ● ● ●
- Isolation of teachers, students, parents
- Continuing adult education (\$) on island not accessible
- Libraries wasted opportunity
- Lack of trust and isolation from schools = disconnect from school needs and values ● ● ● ● ● ● ● ●

Question #2: Primary Causes of Unmet Needs

Group 1 (Moana's group)

- Lack of info in the broad community on extent of needs—poverty, homelessness
- Parenting education needs
- Isolation from mainland services
- Difficulty of connecting nonprofits—fragmentation
- Fragmentation of people—geography, socio-economic
- Small schools, no/few other schools to collaborate with
- Time constraints—teacher/kids/families
- Isolation from other services and programs and resources
- Fragmentation among on-island organizations and people
- Facilities, personnel issues (re: lack of stable funding for programs)
- No respite resources established for kids and parents in conflict
- No place to go for kids without stable families
- Troubled kids are a challenge to bring to a home; there is a need for trained, qualified providers

Group 2 (Lance's group)

1. Unwillingness to give up power/social real estate to solve problem
 - Money
 - We're too small
 - We have an orchestra—but children are hungry at school—priorities vs. personal self interest
2. Class system and time
 - Nostalgic ideas about school (...when I went to school in a tent...why should this change?)
 - Education = youth in a retirement community
 - Community doesn't see schools as an asset
 - Isolation (geographically and philosophically) and lack of interest in schools
3. Money and Facilities
 - Unappreciated value of vocational education
 - Size of enrollment
4. New = threat
5. Growth-fast growing Spanish-speaking population-and desire not to notice
 - Trained bilingual professionals

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Core Learnings from Today (All)

- Concerns are not so different from other attendees [?]
- √ Importance and need for centralized services
- “Community” is very strong—we have same interests
- Kids couch-surfing (not having a place to live) is a surprise; the community needs to know
- +50% poverty in elementary Public School—staggering
- √ √ While we may emphasize differences, we are a community with like values
- We have a goal to create a civilized society, characterized by music and arts, among other things, but we need to work on basic needs
- √ it is difficult to hear that the safety of our students is not being met
- Similarities of ideas here
- Need to discuss poverty issue, e.g., public school is the largest food bank on island
- Tremendous support from many avenues; amazing opportunities
- Community in crisis—we need to communicate this to the wider community and work on addressing it
- Where there’s a will there’s a way (with respect to community in crisis)
- Appreciative of this group and discussion
