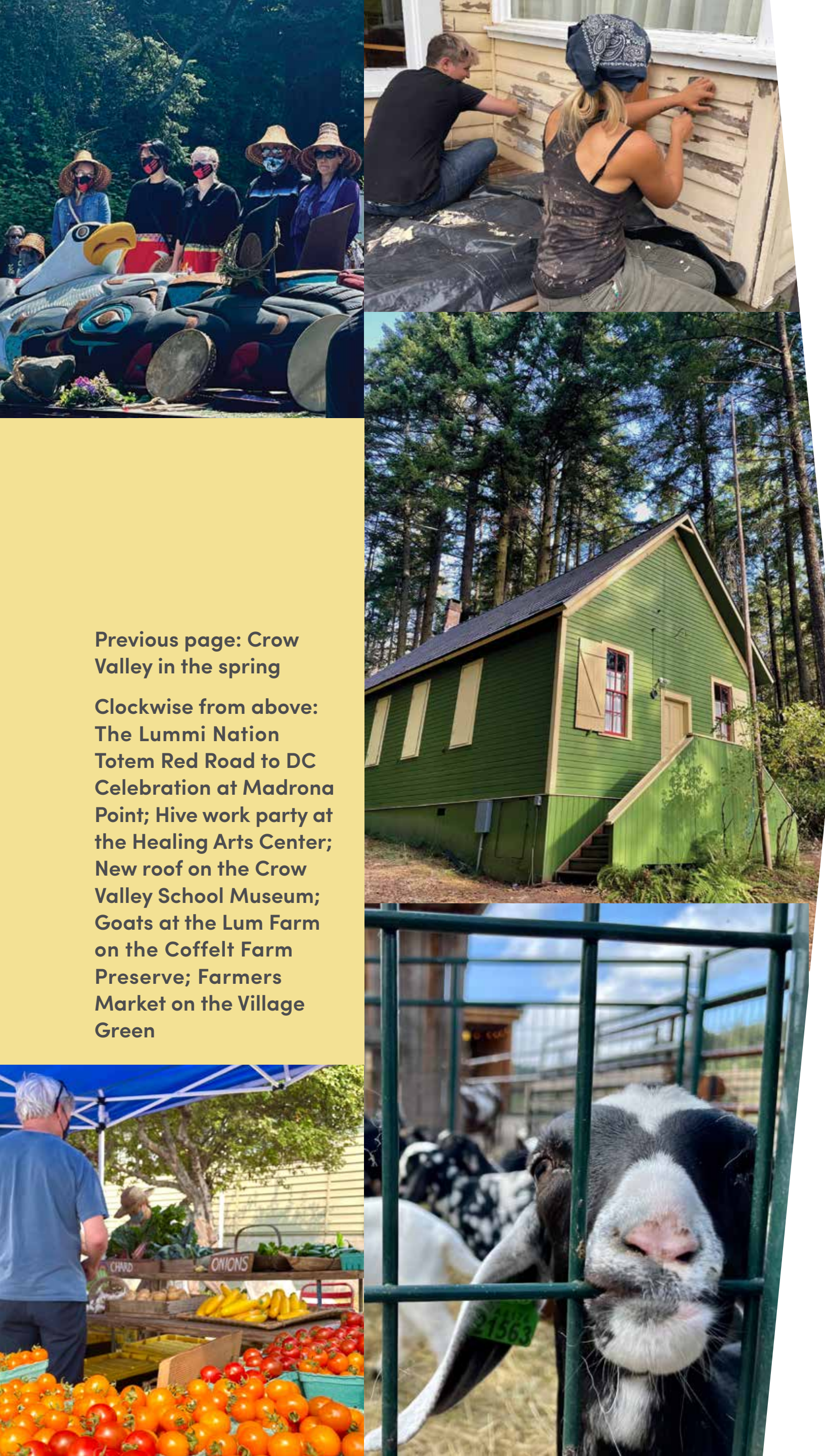

ABOUT OICF

The Orcas Island Community Foundation is as unique as Orcas Island.

OICF was launched in 1995 by a group of islanders who wanted to build a stronger sense of community through philanthropy. Working together, they helped build the Medical Clinic, the Senior Center, expanded the Library and much more.

Over 27 years, OICF has grown into a nationally recognized organization, and was #1 in gifts per capita in 2020 according to CF Insights. We manage over \$20 million in assets, representing over 170 funds for organizations and individual donor advisors. In 2021, \$3.9 million in grants were processed through OICF. Remarkable given the size of this community.

OICF has developed the GiveOrcas Campaign ([go here to learn more](#)) to provide resources for programs serving the community. Twice a year, nonprofits submit proposals requesting funding, and we bring together a team of community volunteers to review and vet opportunities. The list is posted online, and the community is invited to contribute what they can, where they want. OICF handles all of the administration and even covers the credit card fees, so 100% of the donation goes to the proposals — GiveOrcas is a true community wide effort.



THE ISLAND NONPROFITS

Orcas relies on the nonprofit sector to provide social services, education, cultural activities, housing and food support and so much more.

With over 100 active organizations there is an abundance of opportunities to get involved as a volunteer, donor, or active member.

Along with grantmaking, OICF supports building the capacity of local organizations through board and volunteer training, workshops, and fund management.

We have spent decades working with our island nonprofits, not only helping them become better organizations, but also working to strengthen the relationships between all of our nonprofits. Part of that is holding hour-long community check-in Zoom calls once a month to share updates and ideas with each other so that we maintain strong connections with each other and to make sure that everyone is well-informed as we work together.

Beyond our public and private schools, our arts and education sectors are rich and varied on Orcas. To name a few, the Airhawks Flying Club provides high school aged students with flight training, the Orcas Island Historical Museums shares the unique history of the island, and the Funhouse Commons provides a community center for kids of all ages.

It should be no surprise that the environmental nonprofits are also abundant, from the Land Bank, the Youth Conservation Corp, the SeaDoc Society, Wolf Hollow Wildlife Rehabilitation Center, and Farm to Classroom Program.

We have only started to scratch the surface of making Orcas a stronger and more resilient community. For a full list of the nonprofits in our community, see the list on the next two pages.

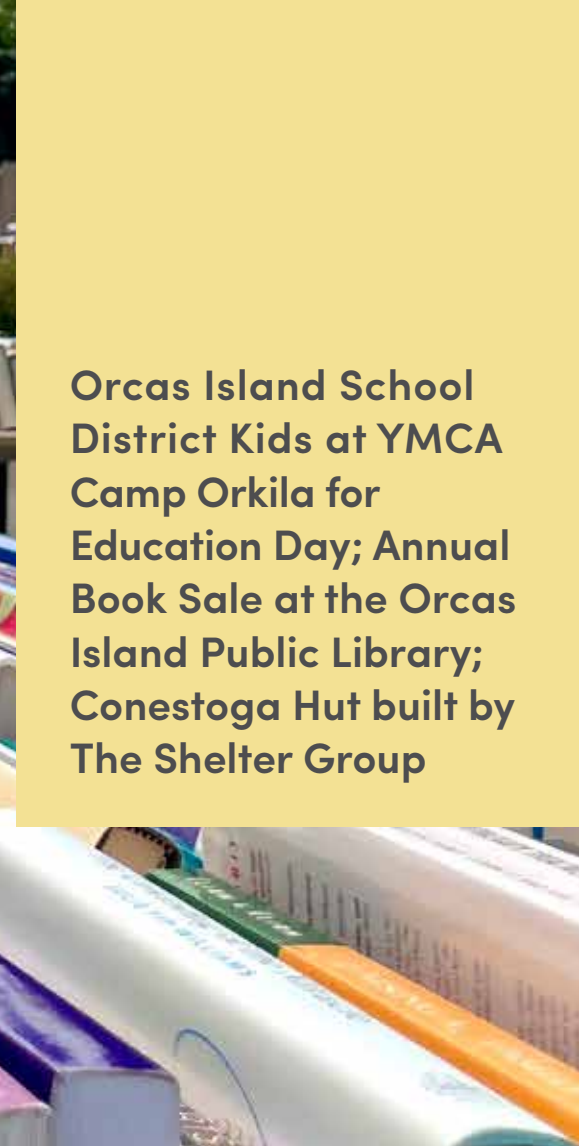

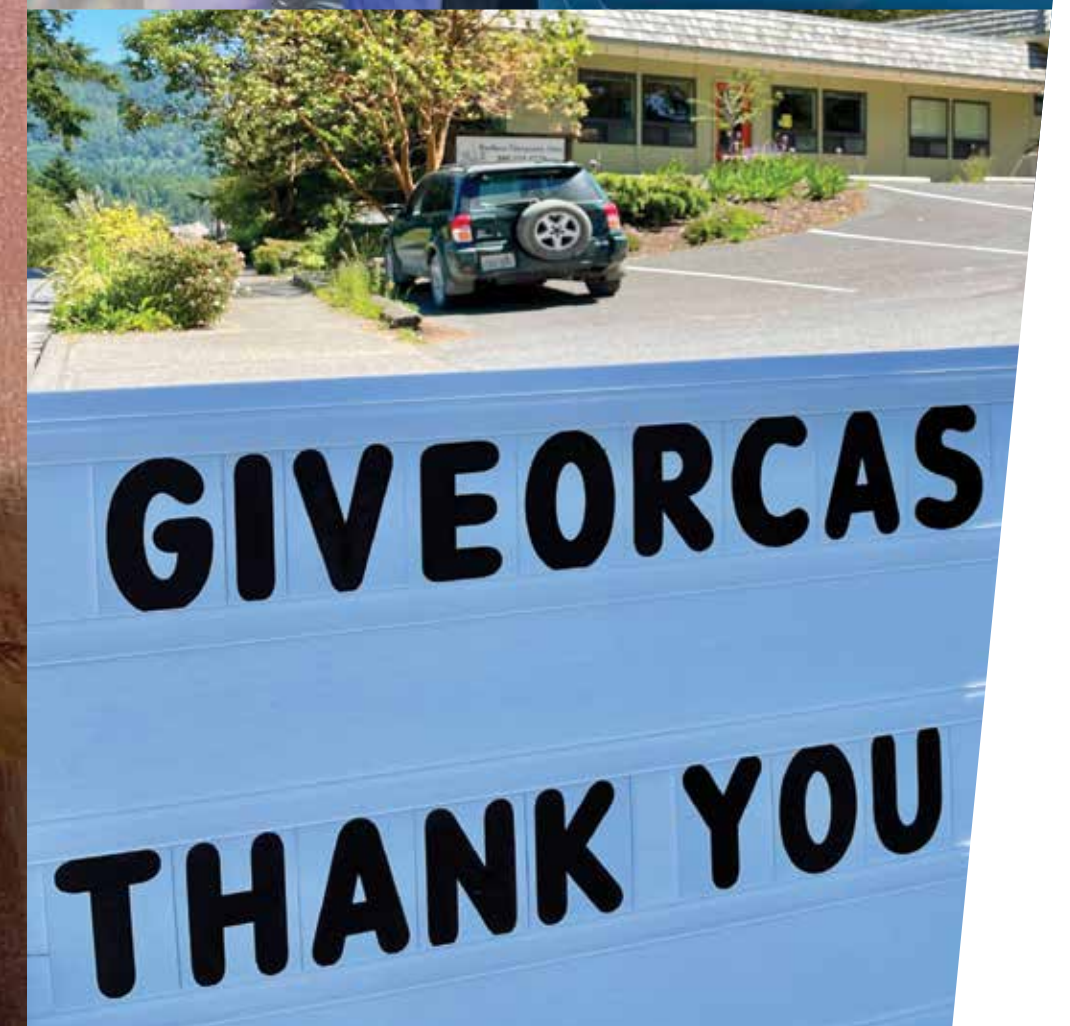

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

The Foster family has multi-generational ties with a Mexican pueblo, dating back to 1945, when Jeremy's father was working as an anthropologist in Michoacan.

This past year, the Fosters decided to honor the Pichu family connection by starting the Pichu Fund, which provides an annual scholarship to a Latina/Latino High School student pursuing higher education. They set up the fund to ensure that the connection continues on.

Bob and Betty Lundeen set up an endowed fund at OICF. Their focuses were the Library, seniors, education, and medical services. Last year, it provided a Social and Emotional Advocate at the middle school—timely support for so many. This year, it went to the Senior Center. They will use the funds to support island seniors.

Ginny Lu Wood left the proceeds from the sale of her home to OICF. In her lifetime, Ginny was a strong advocate for the Eastsound community and the Salish Sea. Her legacy gift has provided funding for the new playground and water fountain in the Village Green. We made sure the fountain was dog friendly in honor of Jesse, her wonder dog.

Legacy gifts come in all sizes and can be focused on what you love most. It is a lovely way to give back to this community that has given so much to each of us. We are happy to help you set up a fund at any time.

We invite you to consider opening a fund of your own. Setting up a fund is a simple process. We accept different kinds of assets and can facilitate even the most complex forms of giving, including

Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD), stock transfers, pass through gifts/grants, and gifts of real estate. We offer five different investment options and have low administrative fees. All fund owners have cloud-based access to their accounts, making grantmaking a simple process.

OICF manages over \$19 million in assets while keeping our administrative expenses exceptionally low.

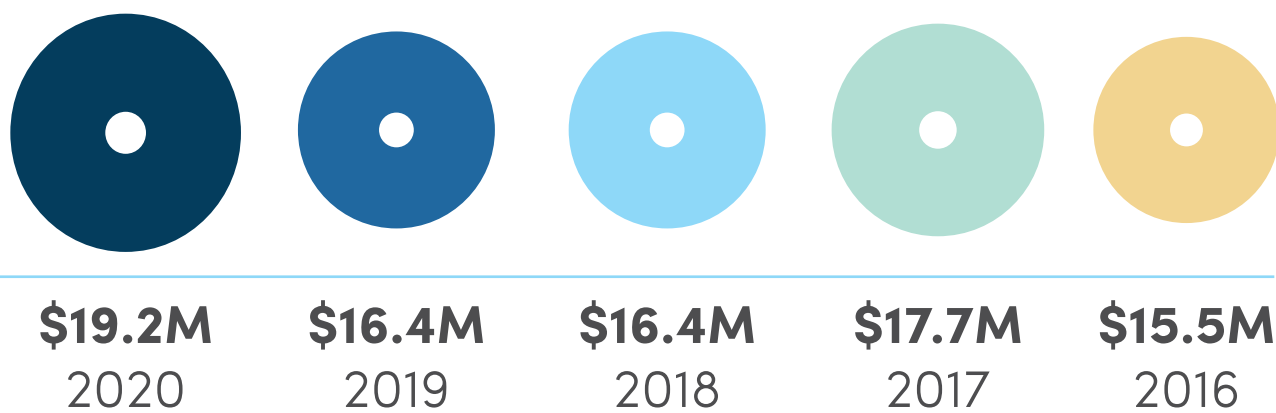

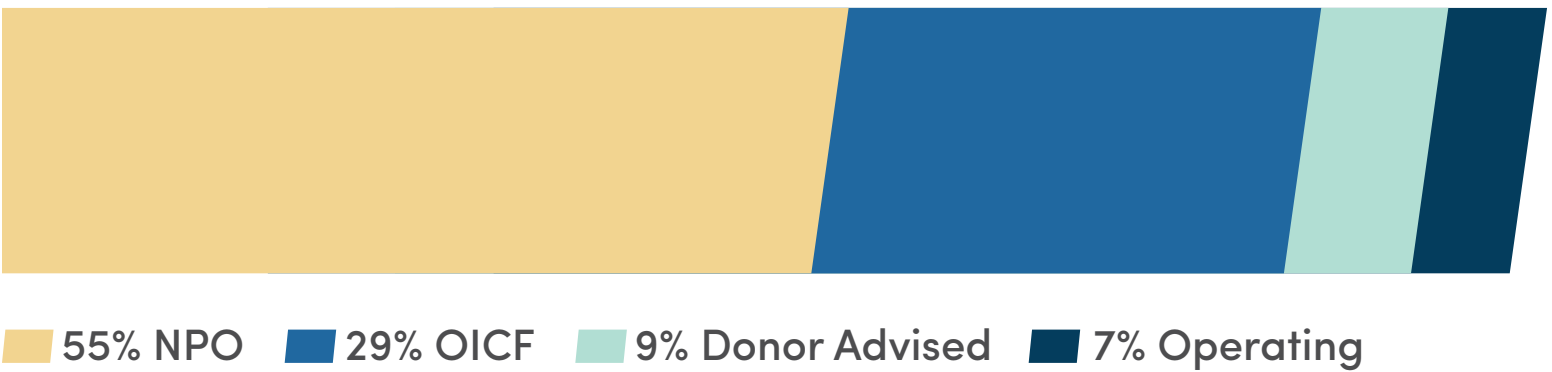

TOTAL ASSETS



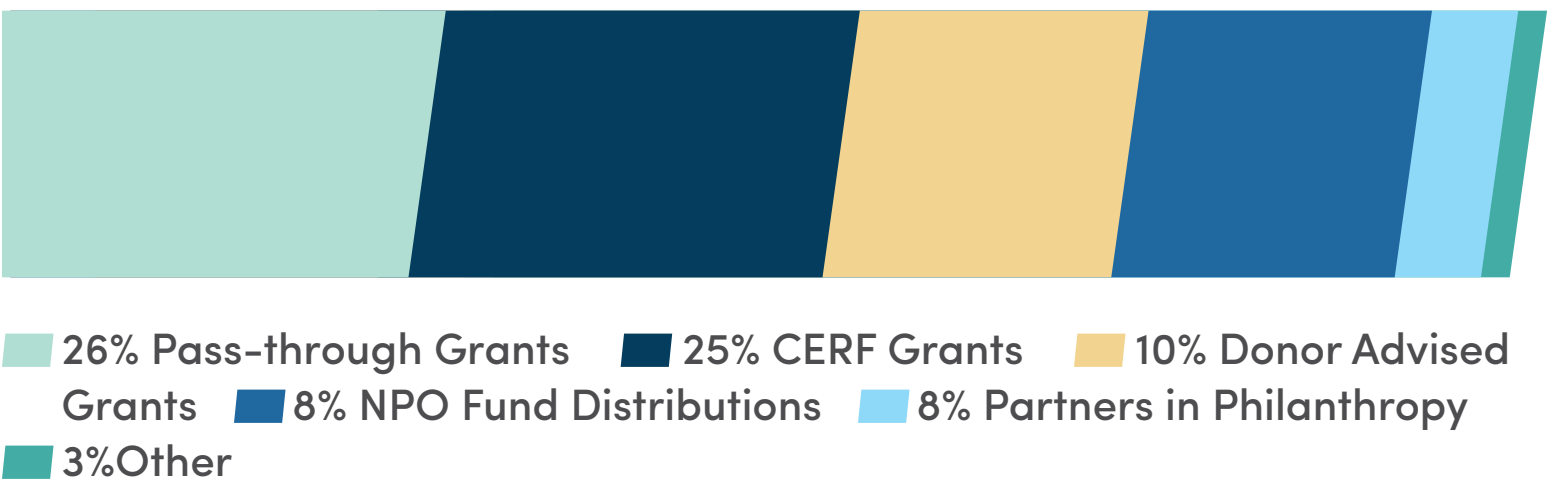
TOTAL ASSETS BY FUND TYPE



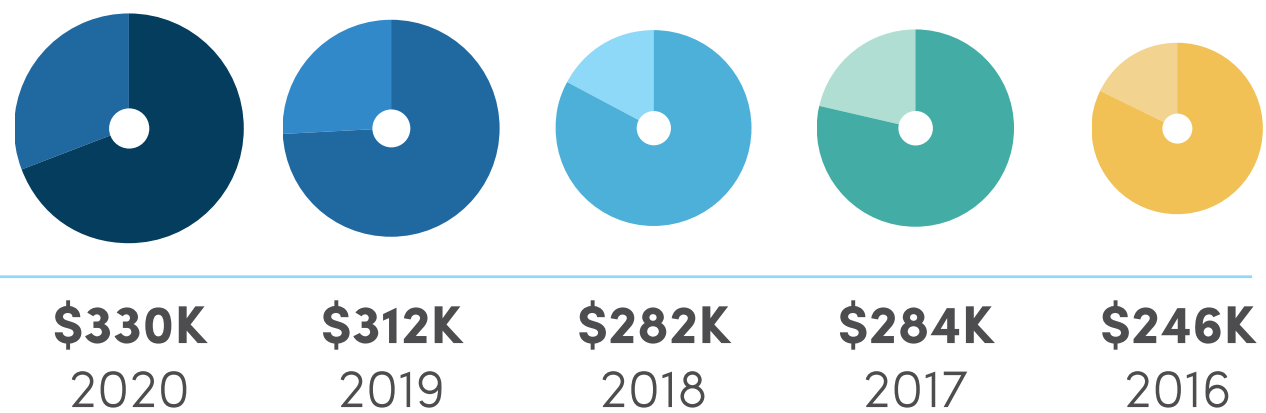

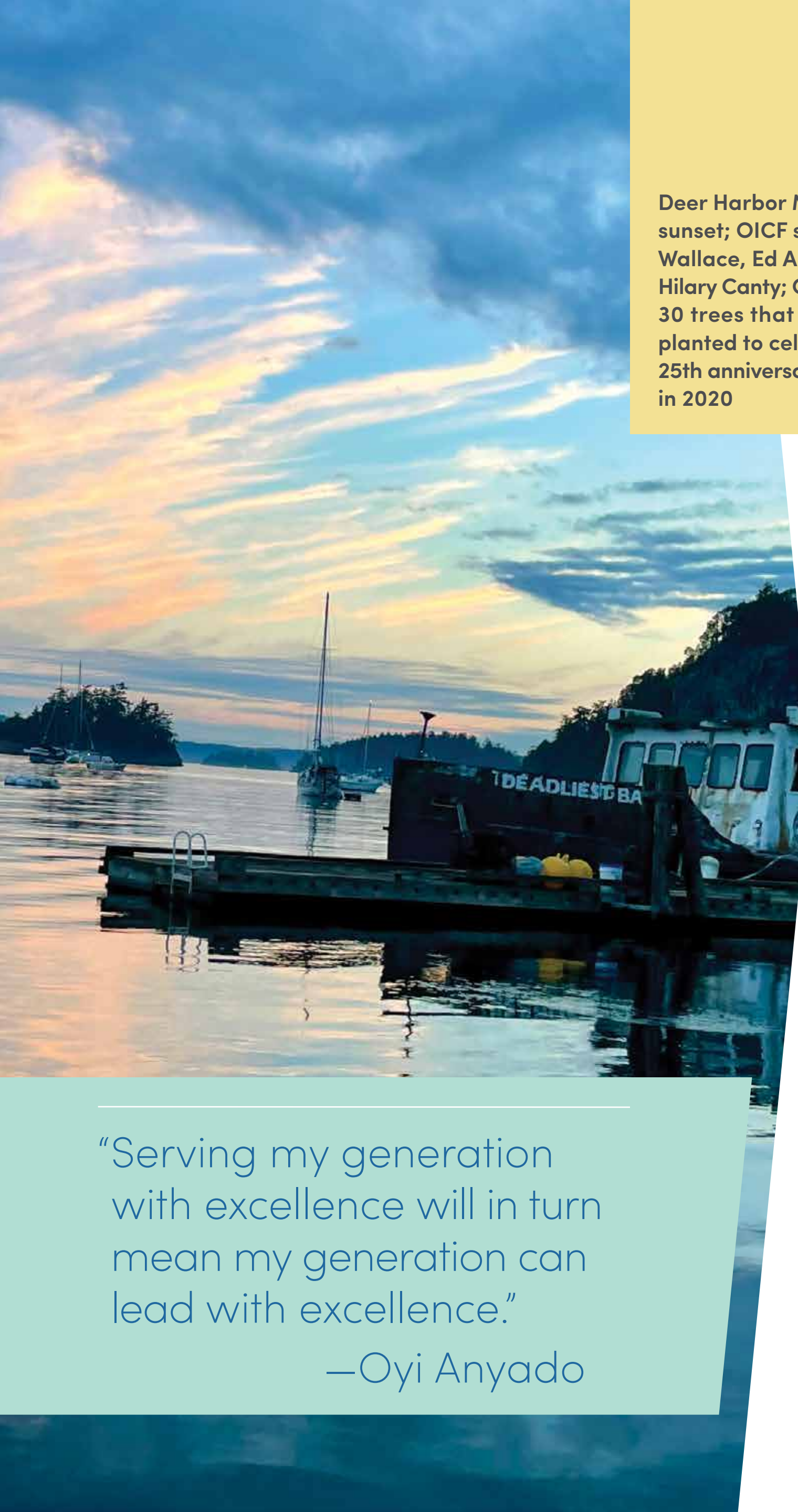

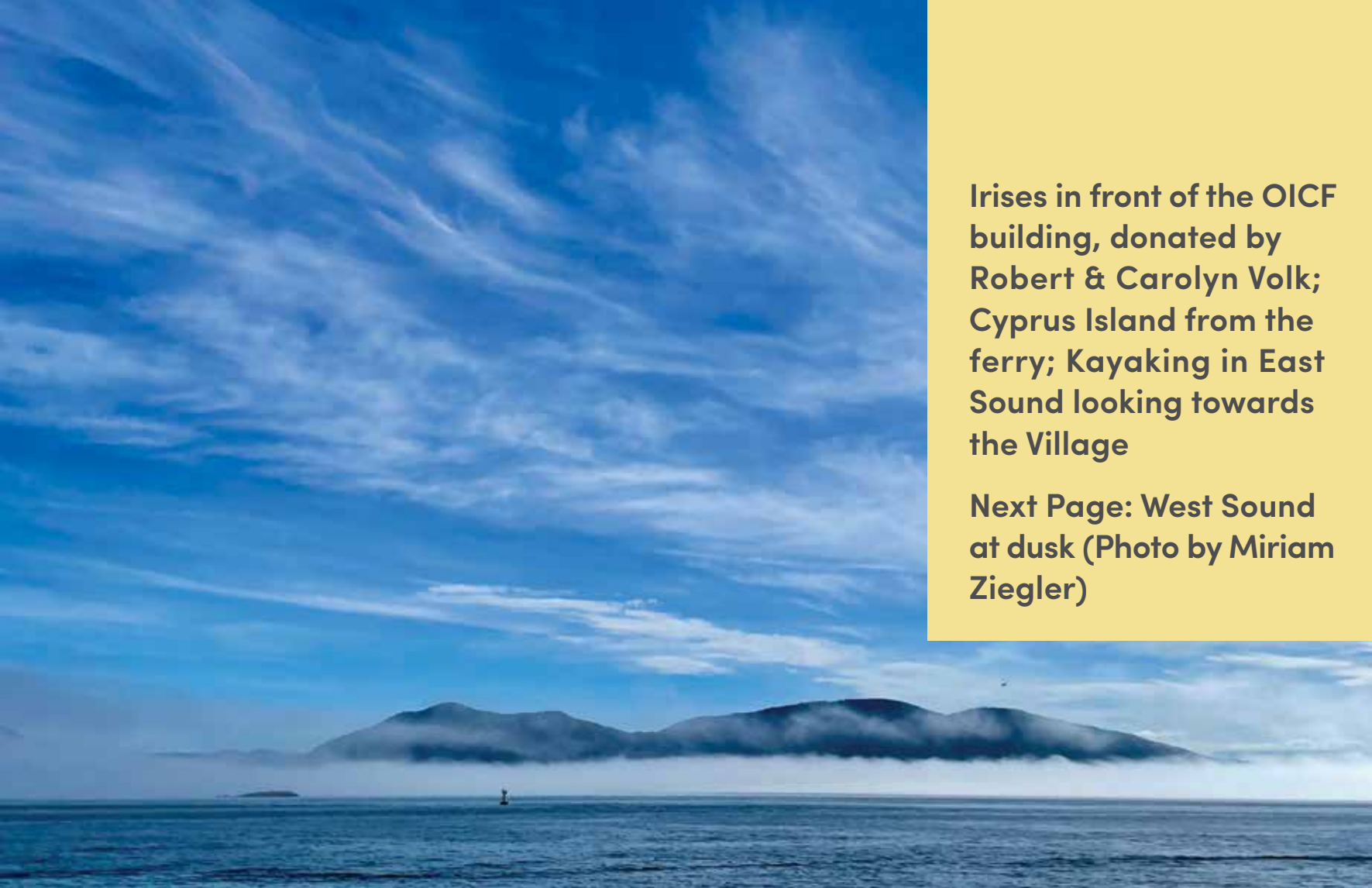
